Photography on a Budget

It is a truism that you do not need expensive photography equipment to produce excellent images, though in some cases it certainly helps. But how little do you have to spend to get going as an amateur photographer who wants to experiment beyond taking snaps with their phone – though of course that technology is increasingly good.

MPB is an excellent source of second hand equipment and may be regarded as trusted supplier. E-bay is also excellent, though you do need to be a bit more knowledgeable to get best use of that platform.

Point and shoot cameras, Micro-four thirds, and DSLRs, whether with APCS or the larger full-frame sensors, are all available at reasonable prices. Personally, I am wedded to mirrorless cameras for their small size and ease of use. As well as owning midprice Fuji X-T2 and X-T20 cameras (both APCS) with a variety of lenses, I have a 12 year old Sony Nex 6 with kit zoom lens. It set me back less than £200. It's compact and light and produces some good images, though it struggles with interior lighting,

much more so than many more recent camera phones.

Once you have your equipment you are able to capture images. But what do you do with them? Printing is an obvious option and you can do this with commercial providers such as Boots or PhotoBox. I also use such providers to produce photobooks and have a small collection of these for recent holidays in a variety of overseas locations.

You may also want to frame your especially good and larger images. I believe this can be done commercially, but it is also possible to do it yourself, and the club will be having a session on how to achieve good results on 9 September.

Many members also print their own images, liking the control this gives them over the final product, though this is something that has never attracted me because of the extra expense and time involved.

However you print your images, you will want them looking as good as possible. This is where software plays a vital role. There are some free products available to download. These tend to be basic but are excellent for learning the basics. I use a free piece of software called FastStone (available here: Download FastStone Image Viewer). This is fine for cropping images (an essential for getting images looking as you want them) and some light editing of the global image (eg making everything look a

bit lighter). However, as far as I am concerned, it is unsurpassed as a simple viewer of large numbers of images. Once you have selected an image you can then seamlessly click into your favoured piece of more sophisticated software. Among other things this will allow you to more easily change small areas of your image. I use Luminar Neo. It's cheap (I was an early adopter and got it for about £80) and does everything I want in an uncomplicated way. Like other rivals such as Affinity and Elements (both a bit more involved) it is available to buy as a one-off purchase, as opposed to a rolling rental with more sophisticated products such as Lightroom and Photoshop. I once downloaded a completely free copy of GIMP, which is said to have most of the capability of Photoshop. Be that as it may it was a pig to use and I soon deleted it.

So there you have the basics. Photography does not have to be expensive. You can do a great deal for under £300 and the ongoing expense of printing your best and favourite images. If you're new to photography I'd recommend that approach before splashing out on more expensive equipment and software.
