Contre Jour

I have recently come across this style of photography, having only been half aware of it before in the form of striking black and white

It is where you take an image towards a strong light source, often the sun. Of course we are normally instructed to take images with the sun behind us so that the subject is well lit. But as with all rules there are interesting exceptions.



Here is an example taken by Patricia Wilden from Flickr. The road is brightly lit and contrasts with the silhouetted man. I think the effect is striking. Sometimes fill-in flash is used to bring out some details in the darkened foreground and there may be interesting rim lighting effects.

I have experimented with this technique with limited success. It is difficult to control and some method of shading the lens is often required. The ones I have been pleased with have largely resulted from chance – just one or two out of a score without my knowing why one shutter release worked and the others did not.

But now a sort of contre jour ennui has developed in my mind. Seeing a great many images in this style at the same time can have the same numbing effect as HDR. The first thing you notice about the image is that it is shot into the light source and an overdose of such images can make you yearn for something a little less contrasty and dramatic. But it is certainly a technique I intend to keep on using from time to time.
